He puckers up.
He holds his arms out further
If you want something to eat, I'm going to have to keep my hands free.
He doesn't move. Neither does she.
BEATRICE Why don't you take off your coat?
NORMAN Do we have time?
BEATRICE Sure.
NORMAN Won't we be late?
BEATRICE They won't mind.
NORMAN Maybe you should call.

BEATRICE Whom?
NORMAN

BEATRICE After we eat.
NORMAN Okay.
He hangs up his coat, puts the gloves in the coat pocket, but leaves his hat on.

She ties an apron around his neck.

NORMAN, seeing a cup in front of him, takes a sip.
BEATRICE There's nothing in there yet.

NORMAN Sure.
BEA pours tea into his cup. He lifts it to drink.
BEATRICE Don't scald yourself!
NORMAN freezes.
BEATRICE Let it cool down first.
NORMAN Til it's lukewarm?

BEATRICE Oh, you don't drive anymore, Norman.
NORMAN I don't?
BEATRICE No.
NORMAN My eyes aren't so good.
BEATRICE That's a nuisance, isn't it?
NORMAN I'll say.
She dishes him out a bowl of soup. He goes to drink the tea.

She gets up, gets the mustard out of the refrigerator, takes the lid off, and hands it to him. He looks at it. **BEATRICE** Take some out of the jar with the knife and spread it on the bread. **NORMAN** That's what I was about to do! You read my mind. BEATRICE After fifty-three years you don't think I can read your mind? He still hasn't touched his food. Do you like your soup? **NORMAN** Did I have soup?

Young people don't run off and get married like we did.

NORMAN

We didn't run off, did we?

BEATRICE

You know...doing everything without thinking.

NORMAN

I don't know about you but I put a hell of a lot of thought into this.

She fiddles with the remote. **NORMAN** He never practiced anyhow. Always horsing around. **BEATRICE** You never horsed around. **NORMAN** Oh no. After struggling with the remote, she turns on television manually and exits. Sound of golf commentary from the TV. NORMAN sees the pitcher, carries it to the stove. He places the pitcher on the burner and turns the stove on. **NORMAN** (sings) Ro-ly Po-ly! Daddy's little fatty --He goes to closet, exchanges his winter hat for his summer cap. Finds a golf shirt in the closet and puts it on over his turtleneck. Picks up the golf club. Practices. He has a beautiful, if weak, swing. He makes sound effects to go with his shots. (sings) Hopes to grow up and be a man someday --Ro-ly Po-ly! Daddy's little fatty --Gonna grow up and be a man someday ---Smoke rises from the stove. NORMAN stares at the pitcher as smoke begins to rise and fill the kitchen.

NORMAN doesn't move or say anything.

BEATRICE enters.

BEATRICE

Oh!

She quickly pushes Norman aside. He falls.

She throws the pitcher into the sink and runs the water, then turns on the stove hood to dispel the smoke.

Look at this! Everything's ruined! How on earth am I supposed to --

She goes to the TV and turns it off.

She looks at him and sees that he is wearing a sports

shirt over his shirt.

Where did you find that shirt?

NORMAN

On me.

BEATRICE

On you! It wasn't on you a minute ago! --

BEA is done. Speechless. A pause.

NORMAN is distraught.

NORMAN

Where's the baby?

BEATRICE

What baby?

NORMAN

Our baby.

She is moved. She becomes his wife again.

BEATRICE

Sleeping. The baby's sleeping.

NORMAN

Thank God. I was afraid--.

BEATRICE

Shush. There, there.

NORMAN
He's asleep?
BEATRICE Yes.
NORMAN Good boy.
BEATRICE
Yes. Yes, he is.
NORMAN

What do you mean?

NORMAN

If we're not going to Mass, we might as well have something to eat.

BEATRICE

It's too early for lunch.

NORMAN

I'm starving...

Do I? I try. It's a heck of a way to make a living.

BEATRICE

I thought you liked it.

NORMAN

I like some of it. I like talking to people. I just don't feel like selling them anything after we get into a real conversation. Some of those guys'd shove a policy down a housewife's throat if they thought it would get them a new automobile or a bigger home.

BEATRICE

You wouldn't strong-arm anyone, would you?

NORMAN

No. I believe in insurance. There are so many things that can befall a family and no one likes to think about them, and if you don't have some protection in place -- Nobody likes to prepare. That's the trouble with society –

BEATRICE

Do we have insurance?

NORMAN

Of course we do! First thing I did when we got married was put you on my GI policy so if anything were to happen to me, you'd be taken care of. – What's the matter?

BEATRICE

Nothing.

She turns away from him.

NORMAN

What is it?

It takes her a moment to answer.

BEATRICE

I just don't like to think about anything ever happening to you.

NORMAN

Nothing's going to happen to me.

A short pause as he looks at her. I promise. **BEATRICE** I know. I'm just being silly. **NORMAN** I think you'll really get a kick out of Lake Geneva. There are paddleboats and carriage rides— Someday I'll take you on a round-the-world cruise. On the Queen Elizabeth. **BEATRICE** Do you think we can canoe on Lake Geneva? **NORMAN** Sure. **BEATRICE** In the moonlight? **NORMAN** I'm sure that can be arranged. **BEATRICE** I'd like that very much. **NORMAN** We could go ice-skating there tomorrow if you'd get in the car --**BEATRICE** That's foolish. There's a blizzard. **NORMAN** Look at that. Buried in snow. I was hoping to take you out for a drive. Give you another lesson. **BEATRICE** Maybe when the snow melts.

NORMAN

That won't be until April! Don't you want to learn how to operate a machine like that?

BEATRICE

I don't know why I should learn to drive when we don't even have a car.

NORMAN

What do you call that?

He points to car out the window.

BEATRICE

I don't think your brother likes me driving his car.

NORMAN

He gets up, gets the bread from the bin, the cheese and the mustard out of the refrigerator, takes the lid off, and makes himself a sandwich. He watches her cut carrots. **NORMAN** You really are a good cook! And you think of everything! You read my mind. **BEATRICE** After three whole months of marriage you don't think I can read your mind? She watches him bite into sandwich.

Save room for your stew!

BEATRICE But I make it every Sunday. **NORMAN** I know. **BEATRICE** Why didn't you say something? **NORMAN** To be polite. I figure it's time to drop all that. **BEATRICE** Politeness? **NORMAN** You don't want me to tell you I like it just to keep up appearances, do you? **BEATRICE** Yes, I do! **NORMAN** But it's important for a man and his wife to get along and understand each other a little. Bea gets bin and dumps all the cut vegetables in. **NORMAN** For Pete's sakes, I just wanted a sandwich to start me off. I like eating in courses. **BEATRICE** You never mentioned that before. **NORMAN** In France, they sat down to eight course dinners, even during the War. The phone rings. **BEA** answers. **BEATRICE** Hello?....oh, yes! Hello. He's right here. Norm? He mouths to Bea "Who is it?" It's your Mother. He makes a face.

NORMAN

To tell you the truth, I'm not crazy about stew.

NORMAN

Hello...No, we won't be at Mass ...Well, have you looked out the window, Mother? It's snowing -- and Bea's not feeling very well -- we decided to have a bite to eat..... Stew. I think it's a stew....can I call you back?....All right then. Goodbye.

BEATRICE

And we'll start our family --

NORMAN

And I'll get that place on the city council -

BEATRICE

What?

NORMAN

The empty spot on the city council. Some of the fellas think I should run.

BEATRICE

Oh.

Honey?

NORMAN

Yes?

BEATRICE

Why would you want to run for city council?

NORMAN

You have to start somewhere --

I thought you liked selling insurance.

NORMAN

Who likes a job like that, Bea? Anyone can do a job like that! Wouldn't you like to see me get a few laws passed? Get some motions in motion? Fill a few potholes? I think there should be a park in that vacant lot off Lincoln Boulevard and maybe we could even get a pool built where citizens could cool off in the summertime---

BEATRICE

That sounds like a lot of work.

NORMAN

Wouldn't you want to sit in the back of a convertible and wave to the crowds on the Fourth of July?

BEATRICE

Oh, I'd hate that! I really would!

NORMAN

--in a new dress with your hair done waving at your friends from high school?

BEATRICE

If I'd known you were interested in that, I'd never have married you!

A pause.

NORMAN

Excuse me?

BEATRICE

I didn't mean it quite like that. I just don't care for politics.

NORMAN

Only way to change the world is through politics.

BEATRICE

I don't want to change the world.

A pause.

NORMAN

I didn't know you had an opinion about that sort of thing.

BEATRICE

Well, I do.

NORMAN

Hmm.

NORMAN

When I was in Europe, most days I would have given anything to be home.
BEATRICE And now?
NORMAN Well, I wake up sometimes and wonder how we got here.
BEATRICE This is our home.
NORMAN Hard to believe.
He looks around, inspecting the kitchen.
What were the numbskulls in their covered wagons thinking, settling down in a place like this?
BEATRICE They must have looked at all this farmland and seen the opportunity to

NORMANLadies and gentlemen, thank you all for coming. I'm glad there are so many of you, because my wife has hired robbers to move among you.


